Honourable Mr. Prentice:

Over the past year, our organizations and individual Canadian members, as well as other professional associations and their representatives, expressed to your predecessor, the Hon. John Baird, our desire to raise public awareness of scientists' important contributions in Environment Canada.

One of our responsibilities is to address freedom of information, right-to-know, and other news-gathering issues of concern to journalists reporting on environmental, scientific and health topics.

We are disappointed because we received no response from your predecessor to any of our correspondence on the issue of Environment Canada's communications protocol. Established in the autumn of 2007, the protocol prevents government scientists from answering media questions directly and from providing other information in a manner that had been considered routine.

We ask that you reverse the Environment Canada communications policy change, because it is hindering journalists' efforts to adequately cover environmental issues and the ability of Environment Canada scientists to disseminate critical information in a timely fashion. For example, an SEJ member attending a conference recently hosted by Environment Canada was forbidden by the assigned press officer to interview scientists after they had given their public presentations.

The new policy shows a lack of commitment to government transparency and obstructs the public's access to information. The public pays the salaries and funds the research at Environment Canada. Some 60 percent of the department's workforce and 80 percent of its budget are devoted to science and technology. Our job is to opportunely distribute information and analysis to the public and decision makers. Restricting scientists' freedom to converse with media representatives undermines our professional efforts.
